Introduction

Graduation serves to mark the transition from student or undergraduate status to graduate or diplomate status which accords membership of the University. The ceremony emphasises this in a number of different, but related, traditional ways, reflecting both the long Western academic tradition and Māori tradition.

At the start of the ceremony, after the academic procession has entered the auditorium, there will be a powhiri, which is a formal Māori welcome. This serves to welcome the graduands and diploma or certificate recipients as fully-fledged members of the University community.

While most of those receiving awards will have entered the auditorium before the powhiri, the masters and doctoral graduands will represent all the group when they enter in the traditional Māori manner during the powhiri. They will be called into the auditorium by taua (older women) from the Kai Tahu, the takata whenua (people of the land) of Lincoln University. This call is called a karaka. The call will be answered by a taua accompanying the graduands. The masters and doctoral graduands will move slowly into the auditorium while the karaka takes place.

A kaumatua (elder) of the Kai Tahu will then give a whakatūwheratanga (speech of blessing). This will be followed by the waiata (song), E Te Iwi, the words of which are to be found on page 5 of this programme.

During the singing of the waiata, one of the graduands will present the pounamu. The pounamu symbolises the education that those receiving awards have undertaken. As rough greenstone is smoothed and polished, it gains in beauty. The pounamu used in the ceremony has one face polished, while the remainder is in its natural state. The pounamu, which will sit at the front of the stage, opposite the mace, represents the way in which the graduates or diplomates have been “polished and elevated” by their education at Lincoln, while also symbolising the potential in all of us for further learning and refinement.

During the ceremony, each recipient is called on to the stage by name. In the centre of the stage, each graduate is ‘capped’ by the Chancellor of the University to signify the conferment of a degree. Having had the degree conferred, the new graduate is then free to put on the trencher, which is the symbol of graduate status. Each graduate or diplomate receives a parchment which has been sealed with the University seal and which certifies the conferral of the degree or diploma. The graduate or diplomate then returns to his or her seat in the auditorium.

After the degrees have been conferred and the diplomas and certificates presented, the Chancellor calls all present to rise and sing one verse of the National Anthem, symbolising the part played by the University in the nation’s life. Following this, the audience is asked to sing the medieval academic anthem Gaudeamus, the words of which are to be found on page 5 of this programme.

The Esquire Bedel then takes the mace and leads the procession, the graduates and the diplomates from the auditorium.

The audience is asked to remain standing until all the graduates and diplomates have left the auditorium, as a mark of respect for their achievements.

Order of Proceedings

The Chancellor of Lincoln University, Thomas C. Lambie, presides over the graduation.

The procession of graduands, diploma/certificate recipients, University staff and Council members marches through the city to the Town Hall led by the Esquire Bedel who bears the University mace. On arrival at the Town Hall, the graduands are marshalled and then enter the auditorium.

The audience will stand during the entry of the academic procession and will sit when the mace is seated.

The powhiri will take place, led by a kaumatua of Kai Tahu. The doctoral and masters graduands will be called into the auditorium.

The waiata will be followed by the presentation of the pounamu, symbolising the knowledge graduands have gained and the polishing acquired through the process of education.

Academic Dress – The Tradition

In common with English universities, those in New Zealand have a system of academic dress which is worn by graduates to indicate their degree i.e. bachelor, master or doctor. This dress has evolved through the centuries from ordinary clothing. The gown was a medieval topcoat or cloak and the hood, a headcover.

The Lincoln University undergraduate diploma gown is black with green facings.

The bachelor's gown is of Norman origin, the master's gown is of Tudor inspiration. The cap for all graduates other than the doctors is a black

trencher with a tassel. Doctoral graduates wear a velvet bonnet.

Gowns for Lincoln degrees, except for doctorates, are black. The Lincoln PhD gown is black with blue facings, while for higher doctorates, the gowns are red with facings of blue (Doctor of Science), gold (Doctor of Commerce) or green (Doctor of Natural Resources).

At Lincoln University, the different hood colours denote the different degrees.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Bledisloe Medal

Samuel Amuri Robinson

Lincoln University graduates are characterised by many positive qualities which reflect the philosophical pillars supporting this University's approach to education. Among the characteristics that recur in the life stories of our graduates is a significant commitment to community and professional leadership.

This year's Bledisloe Medallist, Samuel Amuri Robinson of Hawkes Bay, has displayed this commitment to the highest degree.

Sam was among Lincoln University's first group of Bachelor of Agricultural Science (Honours) graduates in Farm Management. He was capped in 1972 and has referred to his time at Lincoln as the "best years of my life".

Furthermore, he says "There is no doubt that the education (in the fullest sense of the word) that I received at Lincoln has been unbelievably important to anything that I may have done since leaving".

What Sam has "done since leaving" is extensive and varied and fully qualifies him for the Bledisloe Medal.

Farming is the central theme in Sam's life and he has been an active farmer all his working life. From his sheep and beef property "Te Maire" he was named Hawkes Bay Farmer of the Year in 1986 and nine years later received the AC Cameron Award for Leadership and Excellence in Farming. Last year, for his involvement in production forestry on "Te Maire", the planting of shelter belts and other sustainable land-use activities, he was named Hawkes Bay Farm Forester of the Year.

Sam's commitment on his own property to farming in a sustainable manner, recognising the best long-term land use for differing classes of country, is certainly to be applauded.

It is however in relation to the meat industry that Sam's name is perhaps best known and particularly in connection with Hawkes Bay based Richmond Ltd. He was a Director of Richmond Ltd from 1991 to 2004 and was Chairman for seven years.

During his time as Chairman, Richmond successfully acquired and merged both Lowe Walker and Waitotara to grow the business to become one of the major meat exporters from New Zealand. There was a serious attempt to reposition the company as a "food" business rather than a "freezing" company. The last three years of his chairmanship at Richmond involved a long and protracted takeover by PPCS which was finally completed in July 2004.

Since leaving Richmond he has continued to take an interest in the industry, doing his best to assist in the facilitation of a merger of PPCS and Alliance. He has recently been appointed to the Meat Industry Taskforce.

In reviewing Sam's career and contribution to New Zealand agriculture and agribusiness, the Richmond connection is but one of a whole catalogue of posts and positions he has held.

For example, he has been a Trustee of AGMARDT, a Director of Farmlands and the SOE AgriQuality and has been reappointed to the new body AsureQuality. He has been a Director of the Port of Napier since 1991 and is a past member of the Hawkes Bay Regional Council and the Hawkes Bay Catchment Board. He is also a member of the Food and Beverage Taskforce which completed its report early last year.

Among all this service he has also found time to climb New Zealand's highest peak - Aoraki Mount Cook - and the 3000-metre Tititea Mount Aspiring!

It is often said that if you want a job done, give it to a busy person. That certainly seems to ring true when reviewing the career of Sam Robinson.

In recognition of Sam's boundless commitment to his industry and country, Lincoln University proudly presents him with the 2008 Bledisloe Medal for outstanding contributions to the interests of New Zealand.

International Alumni Medal

Giles John Rowsell

In presenting the 2008 Lincoln University Alumni International Medal to Giles John Rowsell of Hampshire, England, it can perhaps be said that not only is New Zealand a leading world exporter of farm produce, but we “export” farmers as well and this year’s medalist is a prime example.

In fact we could refer to Giles as being “prime export quality”!

Giles came to New Zealand and Lincoln College in 1964 on a scholarship from the City of London’s Worshipful Company of Drapers, one of the great city livery companies, founded in 1361. He was from an English farming family and had been schooled at Marlborough College, Wiltshire.

At Lincoln College Giles completed a Certificate in Agriculture (1964) and a Bachelor of Agriculture degree, awarded in 1968. In sport he was a member of the 1st rugby XV for four years and captained the team in 1967. From Lincoln, with “value added”, he was dispatched back to the UK and the family farm in Hampshire.

The farm in those days was a typical 1800-acre mixed arable and livestock operation and Giles took over its management from his father. Over the years it has become an intensive arable unit of some 4000 acres producing wheat, barley, oats, grass seed, winter oilseed rape, and morphine poppies.

Throughout his career Giles has been heavily involved with farmer organisations, rising to the chair of most. These range from agricultural marketing groups to farm machinery syndicates to The Farmers Club in London, to Grasshoppers, to United Oilseeds. He chairs United Oilseeds which is owned by 3500 farmers, markets approximately 30 percent of the UK rape crop, and is the largest trader of oilseed rape in the United Kingdom.

While a student at Lincoln Giles was a keen sportsman and on returning to the UK he played rugby for London Wasps and Hampshire.

Rugby aside, equestrian eventing has been the absorbing sporting passion in Giles’ life. In three-day eventing he rose through the ranks

to become Team Manager then Chairman of Selectors for the Great Britain Eventing Team. At an even higher level, he was Competition Controller for Eventing at the Atlanta and Athens Olympic Games. Today he has “retired” to a commentating role.

It is however as a farmer, farming lobbyist and agribusinessman that Giles has made the contribution to his home country that Lincoln University acknowledges with the award of this medal.

Among the many farming-related chairmanships that Giles has held, prominent examples are -

- The Association of Seed Producers, established to allow “Participation Contracts” for grass seed when producers became “fed up” with price fixing between merchants and farmers. This gave them the flexibility for Britain to compete with Denmark and Holland.
- United Farmaceuticals, set up as a separate business within the United Oilseeds Group to pioneer the growing of poppies for morphine production. The company has grown considerably and has now been sold to an operator who aims to be using 100 percent UK-grown poppies for extraction by 2009.
- Hampshire Farm Developments, which grew over 2500 acres of vining peas for freezing and canning but ceased trading about 10 years ago when the vegetable market started to collapse. Profits were invested so that when it was wound up there was significant capital to share among members.

Although domiciled half the world away, Giles has never forgotten his Lincoln connections and has always been a great supporter of the University, maintaining a variety of links, particularly as a mentor and host of alumni visiting Britain.

This “export quality” Lincoln graduate is a worthy addition to the growing list of Alumni International medallists.

Honorary Doctorates

Christopher Keith Doig, Doctor of Social Science *honoris causa*

New Zealanders are renowned for their versatility and “can do” attitude. It can take us to the top of the world and peaks of achievement in all sorts of fields.

The man Lincoln University is honouring today with the degree Doctor of Social Science *honoris causa* has exhibited that distinctive Kiwi versatility and “can do” attitude in two separate realms - the arts and sport.

Christopher Keith Doig, OBE, MA (Hons), has through his career given New Zealanders an extraordinarily rich endowment of pleasure, entertainment and opportunity for creative expression and self-fulfilment.

The arts, opera in particular, and sport are the twin poles of Christopher’s life and he is a household name in both fields.

With a life passion for opera, he has spent 31 years as a professional singer in New Zealand and overseas, as well as achieving prominence as a sports administrator, heading New Zealand Cricket for six years.

It is a career that has followed quite different directions from the initial ambition of the young English graduate to be a teacher and “become a headmaster as fast as possible”.

Winning the prestigious Mobil Song Quest while a teacher at Auckland Grammar School opened a pathway which took him to the Vienna Music Academy for two years of intensive study and training and a Diploma in Singing awarded with Distinction. That in turn launched him on an international singing career, winning prizes and acclaim as a principal soloist with companies such as the Vienna State Opera and Linz Opera and at top European festivals such as Salzburg and La Scala.

Returning to New Zealand in the mid-1980s he transferred all his skills and wisdom to the New Zealand arts environment, initially as Director of the Christchurch Arts Centre and then as

Director of the New Zealand Festival of the Arts. He held that post through to 1992 and his achievements were acknowledged with the award of an OBE for services to the arts and the 1990 Commemorative Medal.

Christopher’s contribution to the arts has also included a period chairing the Council of Creative New Zealand, before resigning to resurrect opera in the south through the establishment of Southern Opera in 2007.

Reference has been made to the Kiwi versatility of Christopher Doig and that was epitomised in late 1995 when he switched careers to sports administration and was appointed Chief Executive of New Zealand Cricket. He held that position for six years and early in his tenure he was instrumental in the establishment of the sport’s High Performance Centre at Lincoln University.

Of course as with most Kiwis sport had always loomed large in Christopher’s life. He was an Auckland Provincial Senior Hockey representative and played senior cricket in both Christchurch and Auckland. The enthusiasm for sport also led him to service on the Board of Sport and Recreation New Zealand.

Since standing down from New Zealand Cricket Christopher has been involved in sports marketing and sponsorship and he has recently returned to the world of opera as executive chair of the new Christchurch-based company, Southern Opera.

This comfortable blending of the arts and sport expressed in the career of Christopher Doig resonates easily with Lincoln University where the emphasis is on interdisciplinarity and the cross-fertilisation of fields of endeavour. It is therefore with pleasure that we present Christopher Keith Doig for the degree Doctor of Social Science *honoris causa*, the first time this particular degree has been conferred.

Graham Walter Kitson, Doctor of Science *honoris causa*

The marriage of science and business, expressed so frequently in the career achievements of Lincoln University graduates, has a particularly conspicuous definition in the work of Graham Walter Kitson, whom we honour today with the award Doctor of Science *honoris causa*.

Graham graduated from Lincoln University in 1972 with a Master of Horticultural Science degree with Honours in Agricultural Economics. A combined interest in science and business is clearly indicated in his qualification and, as the years have unfolded, it has flourished into an outstanding career marketing New Zealand products in Japan.

The JATRA Group of companies, of which Graham is Chairman, has interests in processed foods, fisheries, wasabi, plant nursery stock, wine grapes and active biological products. Hi Tech Foods Ltd, the group's "flag ship" trading entity, is a significant exporter of frozen roux, white sauces and other refined food products as well as bio-active products.

All operations have a strong focus on technical innovation, with a special emphasis on technology transfer from Japan.

The connection with Japan has always featured prominently in Graham's business and personal life. He and his wife Nui were pioneers in New Zealand in developing the concept of a three-part foundation for relationships with Japan - cultural, academic and business - and making a career commitment to this.

Through his companies Graham expresses a central theme of his working life - the need for New Zealand to "add value" to its food products.

Success for any New Zealand business in overseas markets does not come without personal experience and understanding of the intricacies and nuances of what might be termed cross-cultural marketing and trading practices. And there is a lesson here for all New Zealand businesses and entrepreneurs looking towards overseas horizons. With the support of his family, Graham spent several years acquiring a

close knowledge of Japan through lecturing in Economics at a Japanese university and studying Japanese language and business. His children went to school there and he has been the holder of a Japan Foundation Fellowship. The award of a Winston Churchill Fellowship was also used to explore cultural, academic and business aspects of Japan. In summary, he knows his market well - that's the lesson!

Graham has always been keenly interested in New Zealand's export performance and fully appreciates the importance of that special relationship between research, science, technology and the country's national economic interests and land-based productivity. He has had a close involvement with the Foundation for Research, Science and Technology for some 12 years and has served on many of its key committees.

His whakapapa is Ngai Tahu and he has been involved through the Foundation for Research, Science and Technology, and independently, in one case as a Board Director, in assisting a number of Māori trusts and incorporations with business and export development. It is work and an opportunity to help which Graham values.

He is too a board member of the Lincoln University-based National Centre for Advanced Bio-Protection Technologies and an enthusiastic supporter of the Food and Agribusiness Market Experience - "FAME". This university partnership gives emerging food and agribusiness leaders full-immersion professional development opportunities in New Zealand and overseas in all aspects of the supply chain.

In the best tradition of a university as a community of scholars Graham is now, through his involvement in the National Centre for Advanced Bio-Protection Technologies and FAME, helping to pass on to the upcoming generation the knowledge and wisdom he has acquired in the worlds of science and business since his own graduation.

Graham Walter Kitson is in all respects a very worthy recipient of the Lincoln University degree Doctor of Science *honoris causa*.

Lincoln University Excellence in Teaching Awards 2007

Principal Award for Teaching Excellence

Associate Professor Grant Edwards

Associate Professor Grant Edwards is a university teacher of considerable achievement.

Dr Edwards teaches and researches in the Agriculture Group, within the Agriculture and Life Sciences Division. After a Bachelor of Agricultural Science (Honours) degree at Lincoln University, a Rhodes Scholarship took him to Oxford University where he completed a DPhil degree.

Dr Edwards has a thorough knowledge of his discipline of sustainable pastoral agriculture, knowledge which he enjoys sharing with his students. He is passionate about both teaching and research and integrates the two seamlessly to provide an interactive learning environment where students' curiosity and interest in sustainable pastoral agriculture is aroused. His approach also fosters independent thinking and problem solving.

Dr Edwards teaches a diverse range of students in a wide range of courses from first year diploma to masters level. He uses a student-centred approach with innovative teaching methods that include question and answer sessions at the start of lectures. The requirement to ask questions is considered so important that if students have no questions, small groups are set to work to develop questions. This has led to the development of a strong rapport with class members and there is almost unanimous approval from students for his approach.

In higher level courses Dr Edwards utilises research projects which integrate senior undergraduate students with postgraduate students and staff. This allows students to "own" a small research project and see a pathway towards postgraduate research. It has also resulted in a large number of students opting to do honours projects with Dr Edwards.

The integration of teaching and research is one of the keys to Dr Edwards' success as a teacher. The approach arouses and stimulates students' curiosity and interest in sustainable agriculture. It also creates a situation in which postgraduates and undergraduates work together to benefit one another; it fosters teamwork, allows development of leadership skills and encourages the development of skills in hypothesis testing and critical thinking.

Dr Edwards' teaching expertise is also valued by his postgraduate students. He supervises a large number of research students and his success is evidenced by the high levels of achievement reached. This has been recognised by significant scholarships for three of his PhD students. Dr Edwards encourages students to deliver high calibre, critical work and actively guides all of his students through the publication pathway. He insists that all postgraduate students publish their work in peer reviewed journals.

Students appreciate Dr Edwards' expertise and teaching ability. Typical comments include: Grant Edwards is the best lecturer I have had in my time at Lincoln; Grant made me a lot more interested in this subject; asking questions made us think about what was being taught.

Associate Professor Edwards is an outstanding teacher who inspires his students. This Lincoln University Principal Award for Teaching Excellence is thoroughly deserved.

Dr Crile Doscher

Dr Crile Doscher has made an outstanding contribution to the development of teaching in Geographic Information Systems (GIS) at Lincoln University.

A staff member at Lincoln University for 11 years, he initially taught in the field of land and water engineering. His teaching is distinguished by a thorough knowledge of his discipline, evident enthusiasm for it and a commitment to honesty and openness with students. Central to Dr Doscher's success as a teacher are the insights he gained 20 years ago teaching English in the Republic of Yemen as a volunteer for the United States Peace Corps.

Appropriately for university teaching, Dr Doscher encourages, indeed requires, students to take responsibility for their own learning and always begins a new class by impressing this upon his students. This practice of making clear the expectations he has of his students, and the expectations that they may have of him, pays off in the effort which his classes put into their work. It is evident, though, as with all good university teachers, that his own enthusiasm for teaching and for his field of study play no small part in motivating his students. This approach is as important outside the classroom, in informal discussions with students, as in formal lectures.

Dr Doscher's field of expertise, GIS, attracts students from a wide range of disciplines. As well as his ability to connect with and motivate students, a significant factor in his success as a teacher is the emphasis he places on relating GIS to practical applications and live situations. Current examples, such as natural disasters or competing uses of rural land, feature prominently in his teaching, along with the regular use of examples from his own research and consulting work.

Intensive hands-on experience for students in front of the computer is also regarded as essential. As Dr Doscher notes: "It is easy to create a map with GIS, but quite a bit harder to create a good map". The time put into making "good maps" has obvious benefits for graduates as they seek professional employment. Dr Doscher's students also benefit from the practical design exercises he assigns them in advanced classes. These anticipate the sorts of professional collaborations they are likely to encounter in their future employment.

It is a characteristic of good teachers that they themselves enjoy their time in the classroom and are invigorated by it at least as much as their students. Dr Doscher's commitment to and enjoyment of teaching are appreciated by his students and he is a worthy recipient of a Lincoln University Excellence in Teaching Award.

Lincoln University Excellence in Teaching Awards 2007

Associate Professor Christopher Gan

Associate Professor Christopher Gan is an exceptional teacher whose abilities have been recognised with numerous awards.

Dr Gan teaches Finance and Economics subjects and heads the Economics and Finance Group within Lincoln University's Commerce Division. Having won Lincoln University awards for excellence in teaching in 1997 and 2002, and a National Tertiary Teaching Award in 2003, it is clear that Dr Gan's contributions to academic life are both substantial and consistent. It is fitting that he again be recognised for his contribution to learning at Lincoln University.

Successful learning at the highest level requires students to have great curiosity. This is not enough, however. Creativity, self-discipline, a strong work ethic, and the ability to pursue understanding persistently over a protracted period of time are also essential. Dr Gan's ability to stimulate these characteristics in his students is exemplary. This is expressed through the high levels of effort students consistently apply towards satisfying Dr Gan's expectations of excellence. It is further indicated by the high level of interaction and critical discussion that is routine in his classroom, and by the large number of students, both undergraduates and postgraduates, who regularly crowd into his office for advice.

A very significant additional measure of Dr Gan's effectiveness as a teacher, and an indication of the esteem students have for him, is his postgraduate supervision. Doctoral and masterate research requires an enormous investment of time and intellect by the student. It is no less so for the supervisor. Supervision thus places large demands on all concerned. Dr Gan's postgraduate supervisory load is a

telling summary of the characteristics that make him exceptional. This is also where one finds perhaps the most powerful expression of how keenly respected Dr Gan is among students. He carries the largest number of research students in the Commerce Division, and has done so for some time. Currently, Dr Gan is overseeing the work of nearly 20 MCM and PhD students. This extraordinary effort is characteristic of him and exemplifies his complete dedication to the goals of education. His willingness to accept for higher degree supervision, a constant stream of promising young scholars is perhaps his greatest contribution to the intellectual life at Lincoln University and academia, and is alone ample justification for recognising his teaching.

In the end, Dr Gan guides his students through the process of educating themselves. As a supervisor, advisor, and mentor, he gets the job done, and done very well indeed. The results past this are equally impressive; an enviable publication record (with his numerous students as co-authors), the lasting and deep appreciation of his former students, and the admiration of colleagues in New Zealand and internationally.

Associate Professor Sidney Weil

Associate Professor Sidney Weil demonstrates exceptional teaching ability through his commitment to, and passion for, student learning.

His specialist field is Accounting and, since joining Lincoln University in 1995, he has taught into Lincoln University's Commerce programmes. Dr Weil approaches teaching and learning in a student-oriented manner and is always well prepared. Staff and students hold him in high regard as a teacher who puts all of his energy into ensuring students learn to the best of their ability and become life-long learners.

His teaching techniques include the use of web-based case studies to facilitate the development of competencies. He is an extremely active researcher in the field of teaching and has numerous publications to his credit related to Accounting education research.

Dr Weil brings extensive international and multicultural experience to the classroom. He stimulates active learning, encouraging students to be critical and innovative thinkers. He treats his students as individuals, learns all their names and relates to them on a first name basis, and recognises their diverse needs and learning styles.

Dr Weil actively encourages students to ask questions and discuss issues throughout lectures and afterwards in his office. Students look forward to, and enjoy, having him teach them again in his role as a facilitator in the New Zealand Institute of Chartered Accountants' Professional Accounting School.

This year's award is testament to the continued and sustained contribution Dr Weil makes to excellent teaching and learning and to Accounting education research. It follows previous awards he has won including the Lincoln University Special Achievement Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1999, the Rintaro Aoki Outstanding Papers Award in 2000, and the British Accounting Association Accounting Education Best Published Paper Prize in 2001.

Associate Professor Sidney Weil is a dedicated teacher with an ever-strengthening enthusiasm to improve the learning of his students. Lincoln University is delighted to recognise his continuing achievements in promoting teaching and learning of the highest quality.

Doctors of Philosophy

Salah-eddin Araj *in Ecology*

PhD research undertaken by Salah-eddin Araj grappled with a very difficult aspect of insect community ecology concerning the dynamics of the fourth trophic (feeding) level; he studied the role of floral resources subsidies for insects in structuring a four-trophic-level community.

Salah-eddin's doctoral study was the first to compare directly the effects of a range of floral resources on a parasitoid-hyperparasitoid system. All previous studies on the effect of floral resources were conducted in tri-trophic level systems. This work provides a basis for further studies and increases the possibility of finding correlations between nectar availability and host searching behaviour, fecundity and sex ratio of insect hyperparasitoids.

The results of this study have demonstrated that aphid hyperparasitoids can benefit from floral resources in terms of their ecological "fitness." But whether floral resources increase their "fitness" relative to that of their parasitoid hosts, so that biological control as an ecosystem function is disrupted through, for example, a trophic cascade, remains unknown.

Salah-eddin came to Lincoln University after working as a Biology teacher. Currently, he is a researcher at HortResearch in Lincoln. Long-term he hopes to secure a postdoctoral fellowship.

David Bloomfield *in Wine Science*

Having completed his doctorate David's long-term aim is to take more time to garden and ride his motorbike but currently he is working as an oenological consultant, winemaker and viticulturist.

Before arriving at Lincoln University to take the Postgraduate Diploma in Viticulture and Oenology to learn more about the "whys" behind vine and wine practices, David was a winemaker and CEO. He became so interested in his studies that he converted his diploma into a Master of Applied Science and then a PhD.

The title of David's doctoral thesis was, "Aspects of Colour and Phenolic Evolution in *Vitis vinifera* L. cv. Pinot noir Wine."

David investigated new mechanisms that influence the colour and stability of wine made from Pinot noir grapes; he also proposed and

explored a new hypothesis about how the compounds responsible for colour and structure interact in the aging process of red wine.

This work, if supported by more research, could well influence the way vines are managed in the vineyard as well as wine management protocols in wineries. There is also a possibility for the introduction of new products that could be available for use in the winery to enhance colour and manipulate the structure of red wine.

Anne-Kristina Buchmann in *Social Science*

Prior to starting doctoral study, Anne completed a Master of Environmental Sciences and worked briefly as an ecological scientist. In her PhD research she investigated the motives, expectations and experiences of film-induced tourists in Aotearoa-New Zealand who were participating in guided *Lord of the Rings* tours. It also included extensive investigation of the film tourism industry and interviews with stakeholders. The study found that many film tourists seek a meaningful, authentic and spiritually significant journey that they evaluate in terms of physical presence at authentic film sites (embodiment) and community (within the tour group). Parallels - and differences - between the religious pilgrim and the secular film tourist were highlighted, as was the role of tour guides in the development of the experience.

As well as providing an original contribution to the theoretical development of notions of authenticity, sincerity, embodiment and experience in tourism, the study also provided a detailed picture of the increasingly significant film tourism industry and insights into the production of film tourist experiences that will be of use both to tourism operators and planners. The study stands out as one of the most in-depth explorations of New Zealand film tourism.

Anne is now working as a Teaching Fellow in Tourism Management at Victoria University of Wellington and as a specialist tour guide.

Andrew Stephen Catanach in *Molecular Genetics*

The focus of Andrew Catanach's PhD research was to identify molecular markers of genetic regions that confer apomixis in the model apomictic daisy *Hieracium*.

Apomixis refers to the asexual production of seed in plants. Whereas most plants produce seed sexually via the fusion of pollen with an egg, apomixis is the dominant mechanism of seed production in around 400 different species.

Andrew identified the molecular markers conferring apomixis on *Hieracium* by screening a number of mutant plants that had lost apomixis. He then verified the markers by tracing their transmission from parent to progeny and is now using these markers to isolate and sequence the genetic regions in order to identify genetic elements that confer apomixis.

At present, hybrid seed is produced by cross-pollinating parent plants that reproduce sexually and are genetically distinct. This can lead to improved yield and other characteristics commonly referred to as hybrid vigour. Because the major cereal crops in-breed naturally, the production of hybrid seed is a complicated process of marginal commercial viability.

If apomixis could be successfully transferred to crop plants it holds great promise for the fixation of hybrid vigour, dramatically simplifying the breeding and production of hybrid seed, thereby enhancing global food production.

Andrew was a molecular geneticist before commencing doctoral studies and has continued to work in this field. Long term, he aims to develop his career in this field and to develop skills in bioinformatics.

Lisa Adelheid Hack in *Environmental Toxicology*

Prior to commencing her PhD Lisa completed an MSc while based at the Leigh Marine Laboratory.

Throughout New Zealand, chemical pollution from urban and rural land uses is having significant impacts on human and wildlife populations, with widespread problems such as soil contamination, aquatic algal blooms, and shellfish poisoning. The purpose of Lisa's doctoral research was to develop and validate methods to assess the effects of pollution, using the marine benthic copepod *Robertsonia propinqua* as a bioindicator of environmental pollution.

The protocols she developed will provide much-needed tools to environmental consultancies and other end-users for monitoring pollution effects in New Zealand estuarine environments. Shellfish species have previously been used to assess the health of estuaries, but their use

in environmental assessment programmes has many limitations, including long generation times, large size, and the difficulty of their being cultured in the laboratory.

The development of a suite of biomonitoring methods using short-generation and culturable meiofauna (particularly copepods) will enable environmental consultancies and other end-users to offer new services on pollution characterisation at contaminated and estuarine sites.

Currently, Lisa is working as a Senior Adviser with the Ministry for the Environment where she is involved in the facilitation and implementation of the aquaculture reforms to progress the New Zealand aquaculture industry. Ultimately she has a strong desire to ensure New Zealand's coastal environment is maintained and protected for future generations.

Matthew William Hughes in *Soil Science*

Doctoral research that adds another piece to the wider puzzle of how New Zealand's terrestrial ecosystems and landscapes respond to climate changes was undertaken by Matthew Hughes.

The last 2.6 million years of earth history have been characterised by significant climate change, oscillating between ice ages and warm periods. Andrew's study focussed on reconstructing the effects of these climate changes on the landscapes and ecosystems of the northern South Island over a period of 200,000 years, covering the last glacial-interglacial cycle.

A major finding was that as glacial periods give way to warmer interglacial conditions, soil erosion in lowland areas increases with the re-establishment of forests, whereas the opposite occurs in mountainous areas. This highlights the complexity and variability of landscape responses to regional and global climate changes. A greater appreciation of past responses serves to highlight the modern influences of humans.

Andrew completed an undergraduate degree in Geography and Botany, trained as a secondary teacher, undertook rural development work in India, completed a MAppSc (Soil Science) at Lincoln University and worked as a Teaching Assistant in the Soil and Physical Sciences Group, before starting his PhD.

Currently Andrew is lecturing in Geographic Information Systems and Soil Science at Lincoln University and undertaking consultancy work.

His long-term aims are to provide information to stakeholders on their land resources, so they can make the best decisions regarding sustainable agriculture/horticulture and ecological restoration and to educate people about its importance.

Shamsideen Iposu *in Animal Science*

For his doctoral project, Shamsideen Iposu examined the effect of suckling (milk feeding) on the response of young lambs to worm parasites. This is one of many approaches to finding alternatives to the conventional chemical control (drenches) of worm parasites in sheep. Drenches are becoming unpopular due to issues about sustainability, consumers' wariness of chemical residues in food, high drench costs, and the 'no chemical input' prerequisite for organic farming. The results of Shamsideen's work could help reduce the heavy reliance on drenches in the sheep industry, reduce management costs and increase farm profits.

After completing a BSc (Hons) in Agriculture and Animal Production and an MSc in Health at the University of Agriculture, Abeokuta, Nigeria, Shamsideen worked as the first Graduate Assistant of his university and rose through the academic ranks to Lecturer 2.

He was awarded a Commonwealth Scholarship to undertake doctoral studies at Lincoln University .

On completion of his PhD, Shamsideen returned to his teaching and research position where he was promoted to Lecturer 1 and also appointed as one of the University's Assistant Coordinators of the Part-time Degree Programme.

Shamsideen has fondly been called 'Prof' by his teachers and colleagues since his undergraduate days. He has been in academia since he completed his bachelor's degree and hopes to continue. Long-term, he wishes to obtain a postdoctoral fellowship.

Theopoline Omagano Itenge *in Molecular Genetics and Wool Science*

Originally from Namibia, Theopoline Omagano Itenge came to Lincoln University to undertake doctoral studies into improving the quality of wool through the use of gene markers.

At present, farmers use both quantitative and qualitative genetic approaches and visual appraisal to improve the quality of wool. However, wool traits typically show continuous phenotypic variation. Selections based on phenotypic data are, therefore, of limited benefit in assessing the genetic merit of sheep wool quality, and genetic progress using phenotypic selection is, accordingly, slow. A gene-marker test is a more reliable indicator of animal performance than purely phenotypic data. Capturing the benefit of these genetic differences could be significant to New Zealand wool growers as they would be able to exclude from breeding programmes those sheep predicted to produce faulty wool on the basis of their genetics. Doing this will rapidly improve wool quality "across the board" which, in turn, would result in processing gains.

Theo has identified a number of potential gene-markers for wool traits including clean fleece, yield and staple strength. She also revealed genetic instability in wool genes.

On completing her PhD, Theopoline returned to her position as a Lecturer at the University of Namibia where she teaches Biochemistry, Genetics and Chemistry.

Long-term, her goal is to work as a full-time academic and conduct research into the improvement of crops and animal production traits through marker-assisted selection and publish papers in internationally recognised journals.

Annamaria Mills *in Plant Science*

Annamaria completed a BSc (Hons) at Lincoln University before commencing a PhD funded by AGMARDT and Lincoln University to explain constraints to cocksfoot (*Dactylis glomerata*) based pasture production.

Annual pasture yields for cocksfoot range from a minimum of 5.0 t DM/ha, in pastures which have had no nitrogen applied and water supplied only from rainfall, to a maximum of 21.9 t DM/ha when pastures are supplied with adequate nitrogen and irrigation ensures there is no water stress.

Annamaria's results showed that pasture yield could be explained by the seasonal effects of temperature, responses to water stress and the level of nitrogen nutrition in the pasture. Specifically, the seasonal responses to temperature were summarised using thermal time (accumulated temperature) based on mean daily air temperature.

Water stress reduced yields because canopy expansion was restricted so the pasture intercepted less light. This was caused by the production of smaller and thicker individual leaves in combination with a reduction in tiller population. Conversely, nitrogen reduced the efficiency with which the captured light was used to produce dry matter primarily due to a reduction in net photosynthesis rates.

This research showed that nitrogen was the main limitation to yield and pasture quality in cocksfoot dominant pastures and highlighted the importance of identifying strategies to alleviate nitrogen deficiency in cocksfoot based pastures.

Having completed her doctoral studies Annamaria obtained a postdoctoral research position at the University.

Brian James Patchett *in Environmental Toxicology*

The doctoral research project undertaken by Brian Patchett was titled "Loline alkaloids: analysis and effects on sheep and pasture insects."

Some grasses have an alliance with fungi that grow in the plant and produce alkaloids that protect the pasture from insects. Brian investigated the effect of loline alkaloids produced in different parts of meadow fescue grass containing the endophyte *Neotyphodium uncinatum* on sheep and two important pasture insects in New Zealand, grass grub and Argentine stem weevil.

Brian's research showed that the loline alkaloids produced by different parts of meadow fescue pasture containing the endophyte *Neotyphodium uncinatum*, were non-toxic to sheep but toxic to the two important pasture insect pests, grass grub and Argentine stem weevil. This finding is

significant in terms of environmentally friendly sustainable biological control of insect pests and related potential benefits to improving livestock performance in New Zealand.

Before commencing his study at Lincoln University Brian was a seed industry technical advisor.

At present, he is preparing scientific papers for publication and continuing research in this area to extend the findings of his PhD work. Brian's long-term goal is to successfully incorporate new endophytes into commercially viable grass varieties.

Sanjeev Raikar in Biotechnology

Sanjeev Raikar completed a BSc in Botany in India and worked on seaweed classification at Goa University before being awarded the Monbusho Scholarship to study for an MSc in Japan where he spent three years working as a research scholar at Nagasaki University. He then immigrated to New Zealand and worked for a commercial company before being awarded an Enterprise Scholarship to undertake his PhD project at Lincoln University.

The doctoral project Sanjeev undertook involved protoplast fusion between *Lolium perenne* (a grass) and *Lotus corniculatus* (a flowering plant) for gene introgression. Both plants are economically very important since they serve as fodder for sheep and cattle. Since the two plants are very different species, conventional breeding techniques could not be applied and therefore protoplast fusion was one breeding option for these plants. Sanjeev carried out a successful

protoplast fusion between the monocot *Lolium perenne* and the dicot *Lotus corniculatus* and in doing this demonstrated that this technique can be applied for breeding between widely different species. However, many more fusions such as this need to be carried out in order to streamline the process.

Sanjeev's goal in life is to be a research scientist and take up projects which will benefit humankind. He is currently looking for a postdoctoral position.

Leonardo Sambodo in Farm Management

For his PhD degree, Leonardo Sambodo conducted research into the decision making processes of technology adoption by semi-commercial farmers in Indonesia using a case study approach. Leonardo came to Lincoln University from Indonesia after being awarded a New Zealand Development Scholarship.

Leonardo investigated the origins of farmers' beliefs and extracted the decisive and dynamic elements in their decision making systems using three different approaches.

The results provided insights into the functioning of farmers' cognition, personality and rational strategies as well as the socio-cultural norms and influences on their decision making process. He provided a more realistic and thorough description of farmers' decision making process in developing countries than was hitherto available. Leonardo's study will also contribute to the advancement of agricultural extension and policy approaches, particularly with respect to Indonesia.

Knowledge of farmers' decision making criteria and bargaining processes may help extension workers to assist farmers better.

On completing his study Leonardo returned to his position in the National Development Planning Agency of Indonesia where he works in the area of cooperatives and SME development. Long-term he is also keen on pursuing a teaching career.

Before coming to Lincoln University, Leonardo completed Sarjana 1 degree (equivalent to a BSc with honours) in Agronomy from Bogor Agricultural University before completing an MSc in Agricultural Economics from Cornell University, USA.

Harpinder Sandhu *in Agroecology*

“Quantifying the economic value of ecosystem services on arable farmland: a bottom-up approach” was the title of Harpinder Sandhu’s PhD thesis.

In his doctoral research Harpinder aimed to improve understanding about ecosystem services (ecological processes) and their economic value in agricultural landscapes. This will help in better understanding of the needs and management of initiatives involving rural communities and other stakeholders to ensure sustainability of agro-ecosystems.

Before commencing his study at Lincoln University Harpinder worked with the Punjab State Department of Agriculture, India, in World Bank funded development projects and policy related work.

Currently, he is working with Australia’s national science agency, CSIRO (the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation), as a Research Scientist (Ecologist).

Harpinder’s long-term goal is to be involved in research and development in agro-ecosystems and use of science based solutions in the agricultural industry.

Matthias Schellhorn *in Tourism and Development Studies*

A long-standing connection with Lincoln University developed after Matthias Schellhorn arrived from Germany to join the Parks and Recreation course as one of the first students from that country.

After working in several national parks and leading hiking tours throughout the Asia-Pacific region, Matthias returned to Lincoln to complete a Master of Tourism Management. He worked on several rural development projects in Asia before returning to study part-time towards his PhD.

Matthias looked at the diverse expectations and effects of tourism as an agent of rural development in ‘third world’ countries using Rinjani National Park in Indonesia as a case study to explore the question “what kind of business is tourism?”

His research focused on the strong contradictions between the promise and social practice of ‘eco’tourism development. Linking two main

fields of human geography - tourism and development studies - his thesis provided a revised model of tourism development that highlighted the various political, ecological, social, cultural and commercial influences involved. Matthias also demonstrated the critical importance of community participation and a more inclusive development process. This applied study will provide a useful resource for government, donor or other agencies that advocate for tourism as a tool for poverty reduction.

Matthias is currently working to publish the results of his research. In the future, he hopes to combine his various research interests with a passion for academic teaching and a strong commitment to “being there” as a father for his young children. New Zealand is now his home.

Georgia-Rose Travis in *Conservation and Ecology*

Georgia-Rose Travis' PhD research focussed on the behaviour of Hector's dolphins and whether they were stressed in the presence of tour-boats. She collected data from Lyttelton and Timaru harbours using cliff and boat based observations that allowed both site and timeline comparisons to be made about changes in dolphin behaviour.

She investigated Hector's dolphins' preferences to approach or depart from specific vessels, the location of dolphin in each harbour and recorded whether their behaviour indicated they were stressed or not.

Her study took two seasons from October to March. Hector's dolphins were shown to prefer to interact with particular tour boats, small recreational craft and small fishing boats but not large commercial ships, fast moving motor boats or trawlers and dredges. Neither the current tour-boat operator activity at either site

or the presence of a private recreational yacht at Timaru had an adverse effect on Hector's dolphins. However, this did not rule out that stress hadn't occurred or that dolphins would not be adversely affected with a future increase in tour operators.

Before, during and after her doctoral studies at Lincoln University Georgia-Rose was employed as a Student Advisor at the University of Canterbury.

Georgia-Rose plans to work as a remediation assessor/researcher or lecturer where she can encourage, support and guide people with their study goals. She is studying Spanish part-time and hopes to set up a business in Spain next year.

Suzanne Amanda Vallance in *Urban Studies*

'Urban sustainability,' the focus of Suzanne Vallance's doctoral studies at Lincoln University, is an increasingly ubiquitous term that features in all manner of policy documents and promotional material. As an ambitious attempt to address social, economic and bio-physical environmental issues, it *appears* to balance philanthropic ideals, such as social development, with environmental concern and fiscal efficiency.

Suzanne's PhD research, which involved in-depth interviews with 35 urban practitioners in Christchurch, New Zealand, revealed that much of the apparent consensus around this term's meaning is illusory and possibly even dangerous.

Her research is significant because vague references to sustainability hide fundamental problems in balancing economic growth with

social and bio-physical environmental well-being. These goals are not always – perhaps not even that often – compatible but many important contradictions lie hidden within seemingly benevolent references to this concept. This suggests more reflection is needed if social, economic and bio-physical environmental goals are to be reconciled.

Suzanne was an Immigration Advisor before starting her studies; she is now a staff member at the University, examining two papers (Social Science Research Methods and Policy and Legislation for Recreation) and teaching the Human Geography component of New Zealand History and Geography. Her aim is to continue teaching and conducting research on the various aspects of urban sustainability.

Judith Wilson in *Tourist Behaviour*

An appointment as Writer in Residence at Lincoln University for 2008 was one result of Judith Wilson's doctoral research into the New Zealand travel phenomenon known as the 'OE'. She also received a New Zealand History Trust Fund Award to rewrite her thesis for publication as a New Zealand social history.

There had been little previous research into the OE even though it is an important cultural practice of New Zealand. Judith's investigations found that the OE had changed considerably over time, particularly the length of time participants worked and the types of jobs they did while overseas.

Travel on the OE has also changed, often as a result of new travel opportunities becoming available, although a number of OE travel experiences have become legendary. Over time, considerable networks of organisations and businesses supporting the OE population have been established in London.

After completing her undergraduate degree in Geography, Judith spent 20 years in London managing a pub and travelling. On return to New Zealand she decided to put these life experiences into an academic context, and studied for a Postgraduate Diploma in Parks, Recreation and Tourism Management at Lincoln University before commencing a MAppSc in Tourism, an opportunity which was later upgraded to PhD candidacy.

Since completing her thesis Judith has been employed as a contract lecturer at Lincoln University, has worked on a number of tourism research projects and has been doing more travelling.

Anita Wreford in *Trade and the Environment*

Anita Wreford completed her PhD part-time while working as a research associate in the Agribusiness and Economics Research Unit (AERU) at Lincoln University.

For her doctoral research, Anita investigated the effect changes in international agricultural trade policy may have on New Zealand's agricultural production, as well as greenhouse gas emissions from livestock.

Her research highlights the fact that although trade liberalisation is likely to be economically beneficial for New Zealand, it will also have potentially negative environmental consequences. The New Zealand Government should have a comprehensive strategy in place to minimise increases in emissions while taking advantage of the benefits arising from trade liberalisation.

Anita is now working at the Tyndall Centre for Climate Change Research in the United Kingdom where her research focuses on adaptation to climate change.

Emmanuel Yamoah in Plant Pathology

Doctoral research undertaken by Emmanuel Yamoah focussed on the use of insects as vectors of biocontrol agents for gorse control.

Gorse is a serious weed in pastures, forest plantations and conservation areas in New Zealand with many of the control measures used to date being unsuccessful in controlling the weed. It has been estimated to cause over \$22 million per annum loss in production to farming.

The aim of this research was to look at a novel strategy to control the weed using insects to carry and deposit a fungal biocontrol agent (*Fusarium tumidum*) on gorse plants, resulting in the infection and death of the weed. The factors which influence the infection of the weed by the biocontrol agent were also determined. Successful control of gorse would benefit the productive ecosystem.

The research has provided information on the factors affecting the pathogenicity of the biocontrol fungus which can be used to improve formulation and application strategies for gorse control. It has also provided useful information on attributes of ideal weeds, pathogens and insect vectors which will be used to develop future strategies for biological control of weeds using tripartite interactions.

Emmanuel worked as a research technician at Lincoln University before embarking on this doctoral research. He is currently employed in the Plant Response Group (Post-Border Directorate within MAF Biosecurity New Zealand) as an adviser on plant pest and disease incursions.
